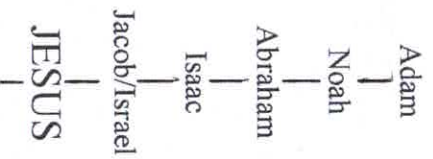
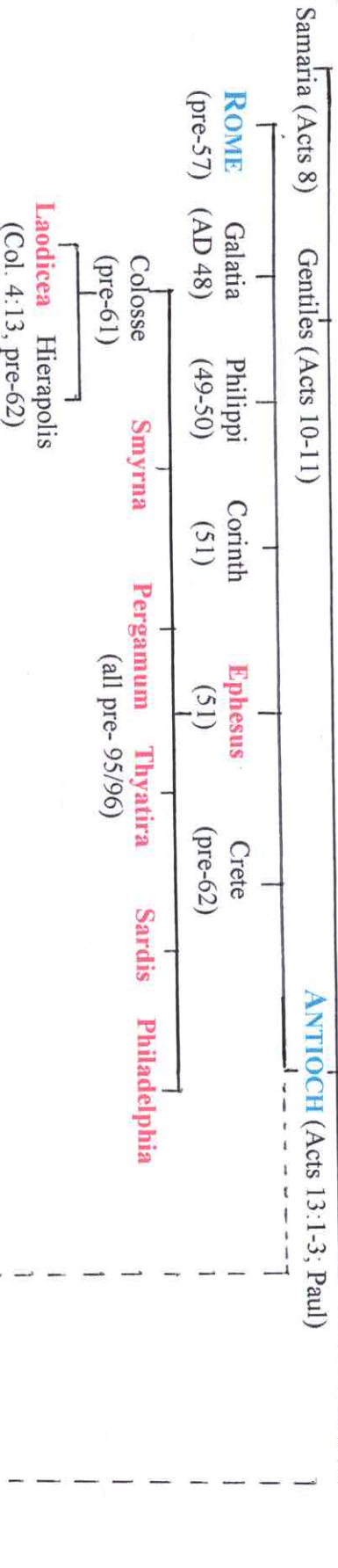

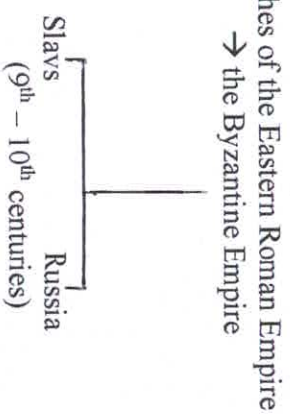
The West

500 - 1000 (the era of church planting and expansion)

many regional and national churches across Europe

England re-planted (A.D. 597)



1054

Rome and the Eastern Orthodox Church formally split

Third Lateran Council, 1215

Functional height of papal supremacy over both spiritual and civil orders

“The calamitous century”, 1300s

100 years war, Black Death, Papal schisms

John Wiclif – the Bible in English

1370s (still no justification by faith)

Council of Constance, 1415

Condemnation of reformer Jan Hus

Martin Luther’s 95 Theses, 1517

Beginning of Protestant Reformation

The Lineage of the Church Part Three: The Reformation in England

- 1520s Protestant wool merchants bring Luther's teaching to England
- 1534 Henry VIII and his divorce: rejection of Papal authority in England; the Sovereign as "Supreme Governor of the Church of England"
[still the case today]
- 1530s-40s Henry, in need of political allies, unwillingly veers more and more Protestant
- 1547 Death of Henry VIII – an ultra-Protestant regency council for the 9-year-old heir, Edward VI
- 1553 Death of Edward VI – his oldest sister, Mary, a staunch Catholic, becomes Queen
- 1555-56 300+/- Protestant leaders burned at the stake; many others exiled
- 1558 Death of Mary – her younger sister, Elizabeth becomes Queen: "mix them"
- 1559 Third Book of Common Prayer (subsequently revised 1604, 1662 [still the official norm in the Church of England])
